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




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A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

It is our great pleasure to share our love of singing with you, our friends, families and neighbors. Your support of our regional chorus is greatly appreciated.

Welcome to a musical tour of Broadway! We are delighted to celebrate spring with you with a sampling of songs from Broadway reflecting romance, courage and a little melancholy.

Our 90 singers have enjoyed working since January to prepare this program for you under the leadership of our Music Director Will Gunn with support from our Accompanist Laura Belanger. The selections include traditional songs dating as far back as 1926, with George and Ira Gershwin's "Someone to Watch Over Me" from *Oh, Kay!* and as recent as 2016 with "Opening Up" from *Waitress* by Sara Bareilles.

As we rehearsed, it was fun to experience the generational differences among our singers in familiarity with the songs. Some of us were immediately nostalgic as we sang "Some Enchanted Evening" and "It's a Grand Night for Singing" while some of our younger singers looked puzzled. A lyric in "Someone to Watch Over Me" says, "I'd like to add your initials to my monogram," a concept barely recognized in 2023. Our younger singers happily embraced songs — such as those from *Wicked*, *Hamilton* and *Dear Evan Hansen* — which challenged others with unfamiliar rhythms and cadences. It was a delightful exploration through time and tradition which we hope you will enjoy as much as we have.

Our chorus had its first performance on May 12, 1974. Next year, we will celebrate our 50th Anniversary with a mix of traditional classical works in December and May and a special piece composed for our 50th Anniversary concert in May of 2024.

For now, enjoy our lighthearted journey through some Broadway classics.

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WILLIAM GUNN MUSIC DIRECTOR

William Gunn is the director of music at Plymouth Regional High School where he conducts the Concert Band, Jazz Ensemble, Concert Choir, Chamber Singers, and teaches

a year-long guitar elective. Mr. Gunn received his bachelor of music in music education from Ithaca College and his masters of music in conducting from Colorado State University. Mr. Gunn has studied conducting with Wes Kenney, Dwight Bigler, Steve Peterson, and Eric Hammer. Mr. Gunn is the immediate past president of the New Hampshire chapter of the American Choral Directors' Association (NHACDA) and serves as the High School Repertoire and Resources chair for ACDA Eastern Region. On March 31, 2023, it was announced that the NHACDA had selected Will as the 2023 Choral Director of the Year.

Mr. Gunn's choirs have consistently received high ratings at local and regional festivals. In 2014, the PRHS Chamber Singers were chosen to be the featured choir at the All New England Choral Festival. In 2016, the PRHS Concert Choir premiered a new work in collaboration with the ALS Association of New England and raised over two thousand dollars for ALS research. The new composition included text by a local author and community member who lost the battle to ALS in 2015. Mr. Gunn has also collaborated on new commissions with Dr. Jonathan Santore and Michael John Trotta. Mr. Gunn regularly guest conducts and adjudicates at local and regional festivals. In 2018, he was a Conducting Scholar at the Delaware Choral Academy in Aix-en-Provence, France.



LAURA V. BELANGER ACCOMPANIST

Laura V. Belanger received her degree from Manhattan School of Music where she studied under Bronson Ragan and Frederick Swan. She

holds Choir Master (ChM) and Associateship (AAGO) certificates from the American Guild of Organists (AGO).

Ms. Belanger is an active composer and has directed and accompanied choruses and church choirs throughout New England, including the University Glee Club of Providence, RI. She is an avid enthusiast of musical theatre and as such has served as music director for many community theatre productions, including *Once Upon a Mattress, Godspell*, and *Cinderella*. In 2017, Ms. Belanger was nominated for "Best Musical Direction in a Community Theatre Production" by NH Theatre Awards.

Ms. Belanger is retired from Steinert's Pianos where she was a Steinway sales consultant. She lives in New Hampshire's Lakes Region and serves as organist at the Sanbornton Congregational Church in Sanbornton, NH.

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
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INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THESE BROADWAY MUSICALS

Annie Get Your Gun (They Say It's Wonderful)

Dorothy Fields conceived of the story of Annie Oakley, the real-life sharpshooter who starred in Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show, as a vehicle for her friend Ethel Merman, who debuted the part of Annie on Broadway. But Merman declined to go on tour with the post-Broadway show, and the part of Annie was given to Mary Martin, who toured with the show for two years. The Broadway production, produced by Rodgers and Hammerstein, was originally supposed to have music by Jerome Kern with lyrics by co-librettist Dorothy Fields. Kern died suddenly before he could begin work on the show, and Rodgers and Hammerstein convinced Irving Berlin to take over.

Dear Evan Hansen and Hamilton (Found/Tonight)

"Found/Tonight" is a mash-up charity single of two popular musical theater tracks from *Dear Evan Hansen* and *Hamilton*, with the proceeds partially donated to the March for Our Lives anti-gun violence movement founded in the wake of the Stoneman Douglas High School shooting. The song's lyrics and melodies are borrowed from "The Story of Tonight" from *Hamilton*, and "You Will Be Found" from *Dear Evan Hansen. Hamilton* composer Lin-Manuel Miranda praised the student-led aspect of the movement, stating, "In the midst of their grief, March for Our Lives mobilized the youth of our nation and created a movement. This song is my way of helping to raise funds and awareness for their efforts, and to say thank you, and that we are with you, so let's keep fighting, together."

Guys and Dolls (Luck Be a Lady)

"Luck Be a Lady" is a song written and composed by Frank Loesser in 1950 and first performed by Robert Alda in the Broadway musical *Guys and Dolls*. (Robert Alda was the father of MASH star Alan Alda.) The lyrics relate the point of view of a gambler, Sky Masterson, who hopes that he will win a bet, the outcome of which will decide whether or not he is able to save his relationship with the girl of his dreams.

Oh, Kay! (Someone to Watch Over Me)

The 1926 Gershwin show *Oh*, *Kay!* starred Gertrude Lawrence, who later played the governess Anna in the Rodgers & Hammerstein musical *The King and I*. During rehearsals in Philadelphia, George Gershwin visited a local toy store and purchased a rag doll. The ballad "Someone to Watch Over Me" was staged with Gertrude Lawrence alone on stage, clutching the doll and singing to it. It was the hit song of the show and became a Gershwin standard.

Pippin (Corner of the Sky)

Pippin's soundtrack is a unique mix of classic Broadway showtunes and modern, pop, and folk style songs. *Pippin* truly paved the way for the modern Broadway musical. Seeking a funky edge, the original soundtrack was produced by Motown Records. There was even a wild rendition of "Corner of the Sky" by the Jackson 5! Most of the promotion of *Pippin's* original production was done via radio commercials, and through the release of "Corner of the Sky" as a chart-topping single. And *Pippin* was also the first Broadway show to release a television advertisement containing scenes from onstage.

RENT (Seasons of Love)

Creator Jonathan Larson loosely based the plot and characters on Puccini's opera "La Bohème," with its timeless story of misfits finding a family within themselves. Its diverse cast contained characters who were black, white, brown, straight, gay, bisexual, and transgender. Unfortunately, Larson died from an aortic aneurysm only one night before the show was scheduled to premiere off-Broadway in January 1996. The show went on to be an international success.

South Pacific (Some Enchanted Evening)

In the original Broadway production, "Some Enchanted Evening" was sung by former Metropolitan Opera star Ezio Pinza. Pinza won the Tony Award for Best Actor in 1950 for this role, and the song made him a favorite with audiences and listeners who normally did not attend or listen to opera.

Waitress (Opening Up)

Before every show, fresh pies were baked with lots of cinnamon in them. As they walked in, audience members were treated to an authentic diner aroma wafting through the theater. Katharine McPhee originated the role of Jenna Hunterson in the West End in London in 2019. Appearing on American Idol in 2006, she gained notoriety on the NBC hit musical series *Smash* as Karen Cartwright, a small-town actor who dreams of performing on a Broadway stage. *Waitress* had the first ever all-female production team on Broadway.

Wicked (For Good)

The Wicked Witch wasn't always named Elphaba. In fact, the Wicked Witch didn't have a name in the original Oz book series by L. Frank Baum and wasn't given a name until 1996 when Gregory Maguire wrote the novel *Wicked: The Life and Times of the Wicked Witch of the West*, which is a reworked exploration of the Wizard of Oz characters. Maguire was inspired by the Oz series' author's initials L.F.B. from which he coined Elphaba. Idina Menzel originated the role of Elphaba on Broadway and in London's West End.

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
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
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
